Synod Watch

The formal parish phase of the Synodal listening process has ended but many voices have not yet been heard; the Diocese has therefore added an online facility for individuals and groups to provided feedback. Hosted by Surveymonkey, the form is aimed at anyone both inside or outside the catholic church, and has just 3 questions, which can be answered in free form and anonymously.

The Synod, What's it really all about?

Even those of us who participated in the four Advent meetings on the Synod may yet be uncertain what it's really all about, and where we're heading. An article by Jenny Sinclair in the Tablet of 1st January seems to me by far the most persuasive of what's been written so far.

She writes that in many respects our Catholicism has become individualistic, which is an obstacle to grace - our seeking for the kingdom can't be done on our own; we have to cooperate with each other. Too many Christians are stuck in a consumerist model. So as individuals we go to Mass, 'consume' the readings and the homily and the Eucharist, and go away again. All too often Christian life lacks the fellowship of mutual love and support. The example shared is of a woman, struggling with terrible debt who went to Mass every week but hadn't told a soul about her troubles.

Jenny Sinclair proposes that there are three kinds of power identified by Catholic Social Thought, money power, state power, and relational power which is the power that human beings build together, and which should be at the heart of the new formation that the Church needs. It is to conceive of church as a community of faithful people committed to a place, outward facing to the world, living in loving friendship with others in the neighbourhood, and with a commitment to building local relationships, personal and institutional.

Fundamental to becoming 'communities of place' are core practices of prayer and discipleship. Many of us will be unfamiliar with what being in relationship with the Holy Spirit is like. The 'cell' group can be the key to this. It is often in small faithful groups that the Spirit transforms, where people journey together, engage deeply with Scripture, and talk honestly about what really matters.

It seems that far from having 'done' our Synod duties, we've hardly begun. (from Francis M)
