A Lenten Reflection: How can we help people who have strayed from the church feel at home again?

In a reflection on the gospel for the Fourth Sunday of Lent, Fr Terence points out that in the parable of the Prodigal Son, it is hunger that brings the prodigal son home. He suggests that Christ proposes the parable to draw our attention to spiritual hunger, which is easier to dismiss, even deny, until we no longer can.

Many individuals begin to struggle so much with life that there just is not time for spirituality. But that does not remove their hunger. How can parishes reach out? How do we make them feel welcome again?

Fr Terence suggests that we are called to renew our own commitment to the life of our parish. Do not think of it as simply the local franchise, but our home. From the moment Christ first

summoned his disciples and called the church into existence, he made it clear that we are fed in community, in a life shared with other believers. Sacraments are public acts of parishes; all are bred in bonds of communion.

A Cry from Mariupol

Hello Val.

It's Eugene from Mariupol. I hope you are all right and my message arrives you.

My family and I are alive. Our flat/home not exist - the house total destroyed. We are now homeless.

I only have this old laptop and some clothes which I put on when we run out of our fired flat. My wheelchair is broken too.

3 weeks we "lived" in a small basement 2x2 meters under non-stoped shelling. We-9 people did not have food almost during 27 days.

We used snow to do water for drink. That was the real hell! Now we are in the 7 kilometer's row and are waiting for registration out of Mariupol.

And then we must to drive somewhere in search any shelter. We really don't know where to drive, we have no money to hire or buy a house.

I don't have any Internet connect. I try to catch any wifi to send my emails.

I'll email you when we will be in safely place. I'll write a good story of my life, when I can do it.
